Happy Holidays to you all!

MRA has had a busy 2024. Here are some of the highlights.

LIVING HISTORY: Asbury Town Neck (ATN) United Methodist Church Documentary

Local filmmaker and MRA volunteer Charles Germain, created an impactful 50-minute documentary about ATN in Severna Park. This work was a two-year collaboration between the ATN Church and MRA, featuring



extensive interviews with ten longtime ATN members, who talk about growing up in Severna Park in the 1940s, 50s, and 60s.

ATN recently celebrated their 136th anniversary. The church was founded in the 1880s initially as a Sunday school for little Black boys and girls in the neighborhood around the headwaters of Cattail Creek. The church was built on land that was originally part of the Old Stone House Plantation. A two-room Rosenwald School and church was first built in the 1920s. Many of the ATN members attended elementary school there and later, until 1967 were bused to Bates High School in Annapolis,

As ATN grew, it became the center of the local Black community. The church members who were interviewed shed light on the way that life used to be in the Magothy River watershed, including topics ranging from the environment to segregation.

The project was funded in part by the Arts Council of Anne Arundel County.

ALERT: Berrywood Community Experiences Dangerous Sulfur Bacteria Bloom

In October, the Berrywood Community experienced a dangerous sulfur bacteria bloom on Cattail Creek. This bloom is also known as a Pistachio Tide, because of its color. We believe that the bloom was caused by a week of rain that washed nutrients, particularly fertilizers, into the water.

At low levels, hydrogen sulfide causes irritation of the eyes, nose, and throat. Moderate levels can cause headache, dizziness, nausea, and vomiting, as well as coughing and difficulty in breathing. Higher levels can cause shock, convulsions, coma, and death.

MRA reported the situation to the County Health Department, but there has been little response. We also alerted Berrywood parents to keep children away from the creek until the bloom subsided.

We are certain that the bloom will recur as we continue to contaminate the creek with nutrients.

Stay alert for an unpleasant rotten egg smell coming from the water: It is a warning sign that our creek is dangerous during the bloom.



Lake Waterford

For those of you who have driven by Lake Waterford, you may have noticed that the County is removing a parking lot and installing a bioretention/ stormwater wetland area that will capture roadwater runoff from Rt. 648, so that the runoff does not contaminate the lake and compromise the yellow perch spawning corridor.

The MRA applauds the AA Co. Executive Pittman administration and DPW for protecting this very valuable resource. There are also plans to dredge Lake Waterford in June 2025.

The dredging is necessary to remove the toxic sediment that has accumulated over the years. Without the dredging, the lake will continue to shrink and eventually be half the size.

Attend the State of the Magothy in March to hear the keynote speaker, Joe Ports from Anne Arundel County Department of Public Works Watershed Restoration.




LIVING HISTORY: Documentary, Betty Cooke Memories of Whippoorwill Girl Scout Camp In the fall, a 12-minute video, produced by MRA member and volunteer, Charles Germain was released for viewing on YouTube.

Betty Cooke, was a well-known artist and jewelry maker, and a former department chair at the Maryland Institute College of Art, and she was a Girl Scout from 1937-1945 who spent summers attending Camp Whippoorwill. The interview focused on her memories of attending Girl Scout camp on the Magothy River. Mrs. Cooke died in

August 2024, a few weeks after the interview; she was 100 years old.

FUNDRAISING: Jolly Dolphin Participates in the Great Chesapeake Bay Schooner Virtual Race

In September, for the second year in a row, the MRA participated with the Jolly Dolphin in the Great Chesapeake Bay Schooner Virtual Race. Our goal was to raise \$5,000 to purchase oyster spat for our reefs in the Magothy River. MRA donors raised \$7,000, exceeding our goal!

The most generous donors were invited by Captain Jack to participate in a parade of boats as they circled the Baltimore harbor.

PROGRAM: And More on Oysters!

In October, the MRA quickly mobilized to accept about 365 bags of oyster spat donated to us by the Chesapeake Bay Foundation. MRA volunteers made 2 trips to Shady Side to pick up the oyster bags and transfer the oyster spat into shallow water near Henderson Point. The next day, volunteers moved more bags to our Rock Point oyster bar for planting. MRA studies have documented

that the oysters planted in the Magothy will live 5-10 years and filter the water.

We are looking forward to studying oyster growth and survival in 2025. Contribute to the Oyster Restoration fund. Our goal is \$60,000 and so far we have raised \$20,000

PROGRAM: Cool Pond

Cool Pond, which is part of the Cattail Creek wetland, was destroyed by runoff and debris from the construction of the new Severna Park High School. The County accepted responsibility for the cleanup and restoration of the Pond.

MRA has been involved from the beginning in the restoration project, which has now been completed.

In November, MRA kept its promise to restock the pond with a donation of 125 Bluegill fish. We wish them well and hope they thrive!



EVENT: MRA Special Event at the Grachur Club

In June, the MRA hosted a special event at the Grachur Club. The event was "For the Birds: A Celebration & Call to Action for our Feathered Friends," a wonderful presentation by Jack Turner, an Annapolis-based photographer and environmental professional.
